

Larson, Pratt Execs Praise Machinists Union on F-135 Deal

U.S. Congressman John Larson (CT-01) addressed a gathering of union activists and company officials on March 16th to celebrate a new \$5.2 billion contract with the Pentagon for the development of Lots 15-17 of the F-35 Lightning II fighter jet, with exercised options worth up to \$8 billion. The contract cements Pratt & Whitney as the sole source provider for the F-135 engines for the foreseeable future, and is great news for jobs here in the state.

LL1746 President Howard Huestis kicked off the celebration by calling the announcement "a major win for Machinists in Connecticut" while thanking Congressman Larson for continuing to deliver good paying Union jobs to the state now and for the future as well. Larson spoke fondly of his East Hartford roots, his parents both having been employed at Pratt & Whitney at one time. He was joined by Pratt CEO Shane Eddy and VP of Military Engines, Jill Albertelli, both of whom addressed the Machinists at the gathering.

CEO Eddy spoke of the challenges of developing and producing a 5th-generation engine with three variants: "There's only one country and one company that can produce it at scale and at rate and in many cases that is as difficult or it can be more difficult at times than the initial design and test. Doing it once is interesting, being to be able to do it *at rate* is really what allows us to say that's we're achieving our mission of supporting the war fighter and defending freedom. And there's a lot of women and men who are working through difficult circumstances, including through COVID, and never missing a beat, to deliver what we needed to deliver, not only for the United States, but for our allies."

Said VP Albertelli: "This engine performs better than any engine in the history of engines. The work that all of you are doing... highly sophisticated, highly technical work. Whether it's coatings, machining, assembly, testing...incredible." Albertini praised the entire IAM and spoke of the 58,000 people across this nation who work on this engine in support of the mission of the war. She added, "That's what protects peace in our country and the 35 countries around the world that we help to protect, which is 43% of the world's population."

Larson spoke China's global domination plan with a goal of implementation by 2040, just 17 years away from today, but he

said "this win [the F-135 contract] again, demonstrates who's dominant of industries of the future, especially as it relates to aerospace." He commended the joint effort between Pratt & Whitney and the IAM to lobby the Biden Administration and convince them that modification to the 5thgeneration fighter jet was the proper way to go.

Legislative Update -- Good Stuff!!

It's mid-April, and that means the CT state legislature is in the thick of the 2023 spring session right about now. The CT State Council of Machinists, the political arm of IAM District 26, is focusing on two Senate bills and one House bill that are currently making their way through the process. They are:

- SB 1179 -- An Act Amending CT Paid Family Medical Leave, sponsored by Senator Julie Kushner. Many of us thought that passing Paid Family Medical Leave in CT would be a good thing. Leave it to the Corporate bean counters to find a way to add millions to the companies' coffers. The way the law stands now, an employee taking time away from work for illness or injury/surgery must first exhaust paid FMLA benefits from the state before their Short Term Disability plans kick in. Think there's a cost savings for the corporations there? SB 1179 provides language to rectify that aberration by prohibiting employers from offsetting disability plans and allowing employees to receive compensation from both plans up to their regular rate of compensation. The bill also includes language for tribal and transit enterprises, and it is currently up before the Labor and Public Employees committee. This is a very complex issue and things are rapidly changing. Stay tuned...
- SB 938 An Act Concerning Unemployment Benefits for Striking Workers. Imagine your union is negotiating a new contract with the company, but the company isn't really bargaining in good faith. The strike date is coming up fast, and you're worrying about the things that everyone worries about in times like this: paying the bills and putting food on the table for your family. It's worrisome, right? Lots of anxiety? Now imagine you're in the same situation, but you know that if your union strikes and the strike lasts more than two weeks, you can collect unemployment benefits from the State of Connecticut. You can feel that anxiety just melt away, right? That's what SB 938 will do. It will help to level the playing field when unions exercise their right to strike, and get them out from over the barrel that companies like to hold them over, knowing we have a cushion to fall back on instead of the daggers of financial ruin. It's not pie-in-the sky, either. Our Brothers and Sisters in New York and New Jersey already have this protIt even makes the prospect of scabbing less lucrative and less likely for some people. HB 6205 — An Act Concerning the Development of an Aerospace Advance Manufacturing High School, introduced by Rep. Linehan and Sen. Hochadel. The concept of an "Aviation High School" in Connecticut is still in an exploratory phase, but this bill would establish a working committee to establish the feasibility of creating such a program in our state. This program would give high school students an opportunity to focus on skills that would make them more attractive to companies like Pratt & Whitney at an earlier age, and provide a pipeline of talent for the aerospace industry in Connecticut to draw upon. LL 700 Legislative Chair Mark Nati has already traveled with Sen Hochadel to an Aviation High School in New York City to see for themselves how the school operates. According to Nati. Pratt & Whitney supports HB 6205, and why not? It sounds like a win-win for everyone if the finances can be worked out. The bill is currently under review in the Education committee.
